Minutes of the Annual Parochial Church Meeting held in Church on Sunday 23rd April 2017

(1) Worship:

- Saju (SM) opened the Service and spoke about belonging and gifting. Multiple God-given gifts can make our Church diverse. Prayers and the Reading followed.
- Before the APCM began, SM commented that Church happens due to people giving their time, resources and skills. He then asked all attendees to take some time to thank each other for things they have done to bless one another. Following this, SM took the opportunity to thank 3 people in particular: Rebecca England, standing down as PCC secretary, and Deano Standing and Terry Whittaker for being outstanding Churchwardens for 3 and 11 years respectively.
- Deano and Terry have provided a very high level and standard of support, going the extra mile for the wellbeing of the church. Prayers of thanks were given.

(2) Meeting of Parishioners for the Choosing of Two Churchwardens

- SM was delighted to announce two new Churchwardens. Raymond Shergill (RS) and Helen Towers (HT). It was proposed they be appointed for the coming year. This was unanimously agreed.
- RS and HT joined the meeting at the front of Church.

(3) The Annual Parochial Church Meeting of St Mark's Electoral Roll Members: the meeting commenced at 11.30am

1. Apologies for absence

- 19 apologies for absence were given

2. Minutes of the previous year's meeting, held on 17th April 2016

- There were no questions, so minutes were approved.

3. Elections

3a) Appointment of 5 tellers for the election:

- Jane Bannar-Martin, Michael Young, Andrew Mann, Vince Allen and John Beck were appointed.

3b) Introduction of each candidate standing for election (see 3c, d and e below)

3c) Election of Electoral Roll members to serve on Deanery Synod

- TW stood for election and was appointed.

3d) Election of Electoral Roll members to serve on PCC

- 7 individuals stood for election with 6 vacancies.
- SM thanked Andrew Mann for managing the voting forms and proposed that the additional person be co-opted to PCC due to their skills and experience. This was agreed with 3 abstentions.
 - 3 years on PCC: Jo Whittaker, Siju Adeoye, Paul Smith, Jonathan Mann
 - 2 years on PCC: Glyn Allen
 - 1 year on PCC: Luke Prankard
 - Co-opted for a year on PCC: Keith Sheepwash
- SM thanked those standing down from PCC, in particular Graham Davis who served for many years.

3e) Election of Sidespersons or approval for the Churchwardens and PCC to appoint suitable Electoral Roll Members as Sidespersons

- SM read through a list of 16 names and asked if all were happy for those to be appointed. This was agreed unanimously.

4. Report on Buildings Work

- DS provided the update. As a Church we have 4 buildings we are responsible for: The Old Vicarage, Church, the Garden House and the Church hall.
- During the last year, structural repair work on the Church building has been required. This was partly covered by insurance. CCTV has also been fitted at Church.
- The project for accessible toilets at Church is ongoing. The DAC have approved plans and a structural engineer is being appointed. There will be some fine tuning done by the architect and Peter Guinness will then submit drawings to the Faculty. Work may commence in September 2017. DS advised he intends to remain on the PCC's Property Task Group to support this work.
- Some external work has been completed on the Garden House and internal decoration in advance of Lynne Martin moving in.
- There was a question from Chris Tozer on The Old Vicarage boundary wall. DS explained that we share responsibility with the Diocese and Doctor's Surgery. Work was completed to make the wall safe and the Task Group is now looking at the most cost-effective way to get this fully fixed – sharing cost with the other two parties.

- There was a question from Mike Haslam on church tiles - would there be less storm damage if the tiles were replaced with pinned tiles. DS advised that since insurance covers repairs (but not replacement) this is the best solution for now in terms of cost.

5. Report on the financial affairs of the Parish Church

5a) Report on the financial affairs of the Parish Church (Annual Report)

- Glyn Allen (GA), Treasurer, advised the Financial Reports have been sent to the Examiners and published on the Church website and in Church.
- He talked through a summary of the General Fund of total income and expenditure, with a net surplus of GBP 4,117. The expected budget was a deficit of GBP 19,506.
- Significant voluntary giving (95%) makes up the Church General Fund, and GBP 29,089 was recovered by Gift Aid.
- The key reasons for the difference in budget for the year were the Head of YCF not being appointed and less spent on general building repairs.
- GA talked through the other funds and net assets of GBP 179,559. This includes funding from the Diocese for the Head of YCF role.
- The General Fund balance is currently 24% of expected 2017 spend, so continued regular giving is essential. The current 2017 forecast budget is expected to break even.
- GA then invited any questions. Mandy Tozer asked whether the current forecast budget included all permanent members of staff. GA confirmed yes.

5b) Examined Accounts for the previous calendar year (Annual Report)

- Accounts have been approved by the Independent Examiner and PCC, so no approval required.

5c) Examined statement of Funds and Property for 2016 (Annual Report)

- No questions or objections to accepting this report.

6. Choosing of an Independent Examiner of the Accounts for the current year

- It was proposed that Rob Trice be again appointed as Examiner of the Accounts. This was agreed by the majority.
- SM prayerfully thanked GA for his considerable work as Treasurer.

7. The following agenda items were all covered in the Annual Report or the Additional Reports:

7a) Electoral Roll Officer's Report (Statutory Reports)

- Kelvin Summoogum (Electoral Roll Officer) updated that we have grown as a Church, having seen an increase in those on the Electoral Roll. SM agreed that the Lord is adding to our number, but we need to be vigilant in discipleship and welcome.

7b) Report on the Proceedings of the PCC /Church Members (Statutory Reports)

7c) Churchwardens' report on Fabric, Goods and Ornaments (Statutory Reports)

7d) Proceedings of Diocesan and Deanery Synods (Statutory Reports)

- No questions were received on the above reports, they were therefore adopted by attendees.

7e) Receiving the Reports from Church Ministries given in the Additional Reports and Good News stories:

- Paul Smith - Foodbank: Foodbank offers us the opportunity to pray for people who wouldn't usually be prayed for. Paul told the story of a young man with addiction struggles who received food, prayer and an invitation to join Alpha. He came to church the following Sunday and noticed the impact of the Holy Spirit on his life. SM thanked Paul for excellent leadership of our Foodbank centre.
- Keith Sheepwash - Alpha: Keith provided an overview of the Alpha course; the most recent group had just finished with attendees from different walks of life. There were 12-15 people in each session with a fantastic atmosphere for sharing and teaching. Most committed or re-committed their lives to Christ at the close of the course. The group are using WhatsApp to continue to pray for one another. SM thanked Keith for the blessing and humour, growth and life he brings to the church.
- Siju Adeoye – Our Eritrean congregation: Gillingham is becoming an increasingly diverse community, and our Church is also becoming more diverse. Celebrating diversity and welcoming strangers is something the Church can do. The Eritrean Church meet each Tuesday evening, our congregation has been interested in and supportive of the group. SM advised that Siju has been a true advocate for this Eritrean group and encouraged Church that how we treat a stranger is

very important and based in Scripture. God often comes to people through a stranger.

- Charlie Burston – SOS Club: SOS see approximately 20 children come along each week, aged 3-11. This is a wide range of ages that mix well together. SOS have a good range of talented leaders with different skills, who are excited about the new Head of YCF and including more worship and prayer.
- Trevor Towers – Pathfinders: The Pathfinders group is for 11-14 year olds and has been relatively small in number but is growing. The group spend time on Bible reading, asking questions, and having open discussions. This is an important group in church as it's the age group where many people create their Faith. Trevor gave thanks for this fantastic group.
- The above reports and updates were received with no questions. There were no formal motions.

Statutory Reports

Treasurer's Report



General Fund

At the beginning of 2017 financial year, we forecast a break-even budget on PCC unrestricted General Fund, which included transfers between Repair, Pre-school and HYCFM Funds. This was subsequently revised to a surplus of £21,125 reflecting the departure of the Student Coordinator and a delay in the appointment of the HYCFM. We give thanks to God that at the year end the forecast surplus was significantly higher than our final V3c budget revision, finishing at £38, 292. Overall, compared to budget, our income was approximately £8,200 higher and our expenditure £9,000 lower than forecast.

Donations (Voluntary Income) decreased slightly to £158,858 from £159,271 in 2016 and were higher than budget by nearly £4,000. Gift Aid Tax recovered amounted to £30,873 - a very significant sum.

The Pre-School funds transfer to General Fund, for the daily use of the Vicarage Hall, was £5,000, which is a useful contribution towards the fixed costs for the building. Income continued to be supplemented by rental for the Garden House of 12,200 for the year, paid by the Diocese to provide housing provision for the Medway Campus Chaplain. Wedding and funeral fees, at £2,666 were almost the same as last year. We were fully reimbursed by the Diocese and for the secondment of the Student Coordinator at the beginning of the year and by SMI Church for Jonica Thomas as SMI Administrator.

For expenditure, staff costs were lower than budget by £2,232 due to the HYCFM commencing employment a month later than originally forecast. 92% of Shane's salary cost was met by the £10,000 grant we were awarded last year from The Bishop of Rochester's Fund for Mission. The cost of running our buildings (excluding Garden House) was £5,384 lower than budget. Youth and children, students and evangelism expenditures were also lower than budget. Mission Giving was £12,008, compared to a budget of £15,900. The balance of £3,892 was transferred to the Mission Fund as carry over to 2018. Our total Away Giving was £14,008. Based on 10% of donations received in 2017, our General Fund Away Giving in 2018 will be budgeted at £15,900.

This year the PCC, together with St Mary's Island Church DCC, agreed that the Parish Offer paid to the Diocese, as a contribution to

meet both stipend costs for parish clergy and towards other diocesan support costs, would be £70,000, which was £14,000 less than 2016. This was apportioned £56,000 for St Mark's and £14,000 for St Mary's Island – I.E. 80%/20% split. We need to be mindful that we will be expected to increase our contribution in future years as the Diocese is facing a significant year on year deficit which needs to be addressed.

The General Fund cash at bank and in hand at 31 December 2017 was £75,869. After debtors and creditors adjustment the net current asset was £82,813. This represents a 'reserve' of 41.9% of our 2018 forecast expenditure.

Other Funds

The total year-end balance in our Repair Funds was £33,390. We deposited a total of £5,225 and made no withdrawals.

During the year, we settled architect's fees of £7,781 from the Development Fund, which now has a balance of £68,947.

The balance in the Mission Fund is £7,558, which included £3,892 unallocated transfer from General Fund Mission Giving. We donated £500 to Medway Winter Night Shelter, £500 for the Let Loose concert and £1,000 for Just One at Priestfield from this fund.

The Vicar's Discretionary Fund received donations of £2,850 with discretionary spending of £500 giving a surplus of £2,350. The fund current balance is £3,996.

Donations and fund-raising income in connection with the India Mission Visit were put into a new restricted India Fund. The total received was £17,473, with expenditure of £3,196, giving a year-end balance of £14,277. A Reach at Gillingham Pier Restricted Fund was also formed to support management of income and expenditure for this venture until it is more established. The current balance is £75.

Pre-School income from all sources was £65,571 and expenditure £56,132 giving a surplus for the year of £9,439 and a net surplus of

£4,939 after transfer of £5,000 to General Fund. This compares to a net deficit of £3,482 in 2016. During the year £4,674 was transferred from the current account to the deposit account to increase the contingency reserve. The Pre-school Fund balance is £23,554.

I would like to again record thanks to all those who help and support the financial tasks within St Mark's - the Gift Aid Secretary, Payroll Management Officer, the office staff, the offering counting team, banking of cash and management of Pre-School accounts. I also thank the PCC Finance Task Group for their support and guidance throughout the year.

Approximately 82% of our General Fund income is from voluntary giving and we thank God for the sacrificial giving of so many that His work may continue and grow here and beyond.

Fabric, Goods and Ornaments

The following buildings, associated land and other related assets are entrusted to us and it is our corporate responsibility to care for their upkeep led by the Churchwardens and PCC. Our responsibility relates to:

St Mark's Church
The Old Vicarage
The Vicarage Hall
The Garden House

The maintenance of **The Vicarage** is the responsibility of the Diocesan Board of Finance and minor works have been undertaken by them during the year.

Premises Task Group

This sub-committee of the PCC meets every 2-3 months to ensure that our various buildings are fit for Christian mission and activity as well as to oversee the work necessary to keep our buildings in good running order. We would like to thank the members of this group for their diligence, and in particular Graham Wilkins, Mic Aldington and Deano Standing who continue to make themselves available to respond to emergency repairs and generally serve in a selfless manner.

Some members of the Task Group, as well as Peter Guinness and Glyn Allen, Deano Standing and Graham Wilkins continue to meet as a specific Buildings Development Group to oversee the Accessible Toilet project.

Quinquennial Inspections

The Church building is inspected every five years by a Diocesan appointed surveyor - this is known as the Quinquennial Inspection (QQ). The report makes recommendations on short, medium and long-term issues and assesses the amount to be contributed to the Diocesan Repair Fund which will assist in the financing of such works. The Church was last inspected in October 2013.

Most matters associated with that inspection have now been dealt with, especially given the significant work on the Church roof during 2017. The Buildings Development Group are looking to address the balance of the issues at the same time as the work being undertaken for the accessible toilets.

The Church

We hope, in 2018, to finally start work on the accessible toilet project; the plans have been agreed by the Diocese, faculty received, building plans passed by the council therefore giving us a green light to proceed.

The AV team are in the process of drawing up plans for better quality speakers and screens and continue with the running replacement of items needed to support our activities.

We will soon be undertaking significant repairs to the Church roof and guttering because of storms; these costs will be met by our insurers where the cost will exceed our policy but will still save us in significant expense. The tiles on the roof are not nailed down so unless something is done to rectify this long term, we will inevitably continue to face a problem each time the wind blows hard. Obviously, to nail them all down now would have a large cost implication which wouldn't be covered by the insurers.

We have not lost sight of the fact that one of the two Church boilers remains out of commission. We are concerned about the boiler and the heating capacity as it is under-powered to heat the Church. The Premises Task Group will be discussing this issue shortly and will be obtaining quotes. The boiler in the vestry had to be condemned as it had a major leak in the heat exchanger and was unrepairable. The new boiler for the vestry and accessible toilets will be installed along with the toilet project.

Finally, we would like to particularly thank the small team - who know who they are - but especially Barry Hills, for their ongoing commitment to caring for the building and for litter-picking around the Church and Old Vicarage sites, especially on a Sunday morning.

Thanks also to Stan Brown who has cleaned the church building during the year.

The Old Vicarage

This building continues to be used significantly and is subject to running repairs; our thanks go to all who help in this regard.

Still of concern is the partial collapse of one of the boundary walls on the site, in an area of wall that is St Mark's responsibility. The Premises Task Group will look into this once the Church accessible toilet project is completed later this year. We will continue to be looking at repair/rebuilding options with the other parties responsible for sections of the boundary wall on this site.

Again, thank you to Stan Brown for his commitment to cleaning the premises.

Vicarage Hall

The Vicarage Hall continues to be used significantly and is subject to running repairs; our thanks go to all who help in this regard.

We are grateful to Deano Standing and Graham Wilkins for polishing the Hall floor over the Summer as well as Steve and Lynn Trebill for their diligence in cleaning the Hall week by week.

The Garden House

The Garden house has been occupied by Lynne Martin who is the new Universities Campus Chaplain (a Diocesan appointment) and she moved into the house in April/May time. The house was cleaned and painted, the garden trimmed and made fit for purpose. The GRP fascia and the rainwater goods have been repaired. A special thank you to Deano Standing and the team for carrying out all the work in the Garden House to get it fit for purpose. The Diocese continue to pay us rent for its use by their University Campus Chaplain.

The Vicarage

The Diocese continue to undertake maintenance of the Vicarage in support of Saju, Katy and the family living there.

Proceedings of the PCC

Following the APCM in April, the PCC has met ten times. Samuel Wilkins was welcomed as the new PCC secretary, taking over from Becky England who had been holding the post for the previous three years. Saju Muthalaly, Helen Towers and Terry Whittaker have taken turns as meeting Chair and Raymond Shergill and Helen have been working hard in their new roles as Churchwardens.

Standing Committee members were elected, or re-elected, along with other Officers of the PCC. Ian Graves stood down as assistant Churchwarden and was replaced by Deano Standing. St Mary's Island Church is represented on the PCC by Carolyn Facey (one of their Licensed Readers). St. Mark's Pre-School continues to be managed by a separate committee answerable to PCC and, in the Summer, the Chair, Suzanne Wilkins, and others stood down to be replaced; Lance Hanning was elected as the new Chair. It was

decided in July that Lance should therefore be co-opted onto PCC to represent the interests of the Pre-School.

There have been several changes in staff throughout this year: Lynne Martin left the employment of St. Mark's to become full-time Medway Campus Chaplain but still has pastoral oversight from Saju; Shane and Chris Cordle joined the Church in August with Shane being appointed as Head of Youth, Children and Families; and Amanda Maskell joined us in September as our Curate.

Pauline Jackson will be stepping down as Office Manager in April 2018 and it is hoped that, by the time of the APCM, we will have appointed an Operations Manager and Administrator, both working part-time.

Each PCC meeting opens with the Chair bringing a Bible verse and thought with prayer, and every meeting has a financial report from the Treasurer and Gift Aid secretary. There are usually 12 to 15 documents to read before meetings and three meetings a year are short to allow for Task Groups to meet afterwards.

This has been a very busy year for the PCC with many decisions which often had major financial and resource implications. Throughout the year, St Mark's has struggled with issues of deteriorating sound, vision and building maintenance and much work has been put in to enable the provision of an accessible toilet, where we are very close to building work starting.

There was an away day on Saturday 10 June where we looked at opportunities and challenges for St Mark's in the coming years. We also heard about the Bishop's Mission Order for Reach at Gillingham Pier and Terry Whittaker's potential future.

Through year the PCC received reports which included St Mary's Island Church, Small Groups and Deanery Synod.

The PCC regularly receives proposals for new initiatives to consider from the congregation as well as the Diocese and outside bodies. This year, two of the approved proposals are "Who Let the Dads Out" and Just One.

The work of the PCC requires a lot of commitment from members and we do appreciate all possible prayer to support us as we take responsibility for the mission and ministry of St Mark's.

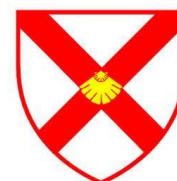

Rochester Diocesan Synod

Comment /History: I know many of you probably find the thought of Synodical Government in the C of E boring and you probably think that it is irrelevant to what happens at St. Mark's week by week. But in fact, in my time as member of the congregation at St. Mark's it has changed our life together out of all recognition.



I have been involved in the various levels of Synodical Government for well over 30 years. In the 1990's I represented the Diocese of Rochester as an elected lay member of General Synod; I am a member of the Rochester Diocesan Synod and was, for a time, Lay Chair of the Diocesan Synod and Lay Chair of the Bishop's Council; I am a member Gillingham Deanery Synod of which I was one-time Lay Chair. I have been a member, on and off, of St. Mark's PCC since the 1960's and a founder member of St. Mary's Island Church DCC. So, I have experiences in all the parts of the Synodical process from the top to the actual coal face. Topics are discussed at all levels and passed backwards and forwards up and down the chain before becoming incorporated in Canon Law. Bishop Michael Nazir Ali was pleased to acknowledge my contribution to the local and national church by conferring on

me the title of Honorary Lay Canon of Rochester Cathedral (There are only ever 4 lay canons of Rochester Cathedral at any one time).

I have been privileged to see many changes that have affected us here at St. Mark's. Just to mention a few: - Ordination of Women to the Priesthood, Common Worship Services which has produced much more freedom in our Worship, Woman Bishops, the need for lay involvement and leadership and so many more other areas that have affected us in the local Church. Prominent has been the many changes in Safeguarding brought about by changes in our understanding, as a nation, of child protection and safeguarding of vulnerable adults. Several cases of the laity, clergy and Bishop misconduct that have been featured in the national press have highlighted our various problems as a national Church. So, although, we may not think it, our life together here at St. Mark's has been dramatically changed by the Synodical Government of the C of E. And I am sure there are many more changes to come in the years ahead, perhaps one of them being Lay Presidency at Holy Communion?

Annual Report for the year ended 31st December 2017: There have been three meetings of the **Diocesan Synod** this year, as usual, held in March, June, and October. The major item was a discussion and consultation on the Diocese's Strategy for the future with the **"Called Together" day** at Rochester Cathedral on November 4th. The Reach Project headed up by Terry Whittaker being part of this strategy. Other items raised during the year were a policy for Laity and Clergy, called **"Dignity at Work"**, which highlighted some bullying in the Church and was adopted as a policy for good working practice in the Diocese. A review was set in motion on the deployment of clergy in the Diocese and, of course, discussions on the Diocesan Budget and the general Diocesan financial situation.

At the October Synod, five projections for future Diocesan Budgets were put forward. The only one to produce a possible small surplus after five years was a 2.5% increase in the overall increase in Parish Offers each year. It also required a reduction in Stipendiary Clergy – three posts in 2018 and five posts in 2019 and 2020. A considerable challenge to us all as some congregations are declining. But the good news is that there is an

air of optimism coming from the Bishop and Diocese about the future and our message of Good News in the Gospel is as relevant today as it ever was.

Let us go on loving Gillingham and its people as God loves them.

Deanery Synod has met three times during 2017. The meetings are hosted at different locations throughout the Deanery with the host Church giving a short update on their Parish at the meeting. The meetings have been dominated by ongoing work to create and adopt a Deanery Mission and Ministry Plan. The plan is intended to be a realistic blueprint to identify and enable areas of work where the Deanery churches can work together for the benefit of all. As it stands, it has four sections: Growing Disciples; Growing Leaders; Growing Resources; and Growing Communities. The plan also has three stages, Exploration, Implementation and Review and Reshape with the current thinking being that it will start to deliver value in 2019.

The Deanery reps. starting 2017 were Jo Whittaker, Graham Davis and Luke Prankard. All three stood down at the APCM and we thank them for their service. The current Deanery Synod reps. are Siju Adeoye, Keith Sheepwash, Terry Whittaker and Eve Martin (representing St Mary's Island) who were all appointed for a three-year term.

Elderly Care:

Charing House Care and Residential Home

We have continued throughout 2017 to provide Christian ministry to the residents of Charing House twice a month.

The Monthly Service: Four teams drawn from local churches take the monthly service on a rota basis which means each team operates three times a year on the second Sunday of each month. Although each team is free to organise the service as they feel pastorally helpful to the residents, certain core items always feature such as, hymns, a Bible Reading, a reflection (as distinct from a sermon) and prayer. Residents appreciate these services which has also drawn a small core of regulars.

The December service is always the Annual Carol Service at which other team members are encouraged to attend to make it more of an occasion and this past year we were led in the singing by a small choir arranged by Kathryn Thom. This was particularly enjoyed by the residents.

Inevitably with the elderly, attendance fluctuates due to health issues and visitors but two members of the Activities Team there remind the residents and fetch them to the main lounge where the services take place. A cup of tea is always provided after each service which affords the opportunity to chat and get to know the residents.

I would like to offer my grateful thanks to all team members and especially the team leaders who have the additional responsibility of organising their team and the service when their team's turn comes around.

Monthly Communion Service: The first paragraph made mention of *twice* a month visits. The second service we have, also monthly but on the last Monday of each month, is Holy Communion but no team accompanies the person taking it.

One of the regular retired clergy developed mobility problems so has withdrawn leaving only Revd Mike McLaughlin and myself to alternate each month. Canvassing for a replacement, or more, has not yielded any volunteers from the local ordained retired clergy.

This service was principally offered to former church members who did not have their priest available to give them Communion. However, it is open to anyone who wishes to receive Holy Communion with numbers varying from three to seven. More recently, a resident confined to bed long-term has also been visited with Communion in her room after the service which she appreciates.

Overall: Our main contact in Charing House is with the two ladies who form the Activities Team, with whom we enjoy a very good relationship, backed by their willing co-operation.

Whilst we enjoy a large measure of stability with our resources, inevitably some people drop out for a variety of reasons so there is always capacity to bring in new volunteers and, especially so, if you can play a musical instrument. Anyone feeling the Lord moving them in that direction, please speak to Graham Davis for more details.

Ministry to the elderly is yet another part of the wide range of Christian service provided by members of St Mark and, in this case, with other churches as well. To offer the peace of Christ, assurance and comfort to those in the latter stages of their lives as well as receiving their wisdom is a great privilege.

St Mark's House

On the second Sunday of each month a short Church Service is held at St Mark's House, residential care home, lasting about 30-40 minutes. We aim to provide the elderly residents with fellowship and spiritual refreshment including prayer, praise and worship. A short talk of about 10-15 minutes is provided to sharing and teaching God's Word and a very important part of the event is the informal fellowship that takes part after the service with a cup of tea and biscuits.

The meetings are organised by St Mark's with help and support given by loyal representatives from several other Churches. Numerous speakers are invited throughout the year, chosen mainly from lay readers and other willing volunteers, and we would like to

thank all those who regularly agree to help with this. There are periodic Holy Communion Services throughout the year which sometimes include prayer for healing and anointing with oil.

Generally, we have five elderly residents who attend but a few more came for the Christmas Carol Service at which we were joined by Kathryn Thom and the choir from St Mark's. We all had a joyous time praising God so thanks to all involved. We had almost thirty people filling the lounge – maybe it was the mince pies that were the attraction!!

Eritrean Church

The congregation are mostly young men age 16-20 living in Medway. However, Holy Week attracted young ladies from their community too, in the daily worship. The atmosphere of worship during the Holy Week echoed exhortations, solemn prayers, native spiritual songs, percussion sound of Kebero Drums and clapping of hands.



Earlier in the year, the lads had their first ever public presentation at the Holocaust Memorial Day at Rochester Cathedral presided by The Bishop of Rochester, Bishop James Langstaff. The Bishop encouraged the attendees on the importance of Welcome, Tolerance and Mutual Respect for all.

In the mid-year, the entire Eritrean congregation joined us and several other Churches in Gillingham for the United Pentecost Service in the final leg of "Thy Kingdom Come" prayer movement. It was a night where 'The Lord's Prayer' was chanted in 14 different languages and the Eritrean language was one of them. What was more moving was the harrowing account of Simon's journey to England, a spellbinding moment of heroism not to be forgotten. The Archdeacon of Rochester, The Ven. Simon Burton-Jones was so moved that he requested their story to be featured in October's Rochester Link.



The year ended with a proposal to the PCC to take on 'The Hub' - a language, life skill, business support and signposting service.

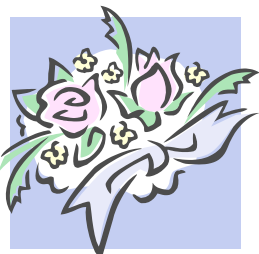
We visited Aylesford Friary in July and many of us went to visit Minister Abbey to spend time with the Benedictine Nuns in August.

Medway Campus Chaplain

One highlight of the past year was a very successful World Mental Health Day which was a joint venture between the institutions and earned us a 2 1/2-minute slot on KMTV 😊

Medway Foodbank Centre for Gillingham



St. Mark's Foodbank has been running well throughout the year 2017/18. From January to December 2017 we distributed 767 food vouchers to people in crisis; from these vouchers, 1,041 were adults, 615 were children, totalling 1,656 people fed.

The vouchers were issued by a variety of referral agencies across the Medway Towns including Age UK, Support Services, Primary Schools, Academies, Children's Centres, Health Care professionals, Mental Health Professionals and Churches.

There has been a steady increase in food donations being brought to us, both from the public and from other churches; this is then forwarded to the warehouse for weighing, sorting and re-distribution.

We continue to offer prayer to our clients with a 90 - 95% uptake and also invite them to our Church service on a Sunday. We are not here just to offer food - a big part of what we do is to signpost people to organisations that can help, for example: CAP (Christians against Poverty) Money Course for people with debt problems; ALPHA Course for those who would like to go further in exploring Christianity; Housing & Homelessness for people facing eviction; The Night Shelter for people who are sleeping rough; and also for those suffering domestic abuse, alcohol & drug abuse. Sometimes a friendly face and a telephone number of an organisation that might be able to help will be all it takes to really make a difference in someone's life.

We are also involved in an initiative called Medway R.E.A.P (Restoration- Empowerment- Action- Purpose). Medway REAP is a partnership of Medway Charities which include Strood Community Project, All Saints Community Project, Home Start, MEGAN (Medway-Engagement-Group-And-Network) who offer help for people who have mental health needs and MRS Letting (Mid-Kent-Residential-Services). All these charities are committed to helping anyone who is in hardship crisis.

During 2017 Medway Foodbank honoured 2,739 vouchers; from these, 3,859 were adults, 2,431 were children, totalling 6,290 people fed. The top four reasons were:

- 1/ Low income
- 2/ Benefit delays
- 3/ Benefit changes
- 4/ Debt

Ian Childs, Project Manager of Medway Foodbank, says *"I am simply overwhelmed by the generosity of those who donate their food, money or time to Medway Foodbank. Without them it would simply not happen. I am particularly grateful to those who are able to meet people at their point of need and to reveal the love of God, through His local Church. The team at St Mark's are a vital part of the work of Medway Foodbank - my deepest thanks to you all."*

Another curry night is planned for March 2018. The food will be home cooked by men in church and the venue will be at the Old Vicarage. Men will be encouraged to give a donation towards this in order to cover any cost incurred.

Mission Links Task Group (MLTG)

The Mission Links Task Group (MLTG) is a sub-committee of the PCC responsible to oversee support of our Mission Partners through prayer, pastoral care and financial support. MLTG recommends to the PCC how we allocate our Mission Giving (10% of our previous year's voluntary income), and other Away Giving.

There were some changes in our Mission Partners portfolio in 2017. With its closure at the end of March, we stopped our support of Word on the Street. We also switched our Tearfund Connected Church regular commitment for the Change a Nation project to the Sahaara India project, where some of the India 2018 team will be visiting in April 2018. We commenced supporting The Family Trust,

a local Christian organisation, reaching children by visiting schools and churches to support their children's activities.

We have continued to support Katy Barnwell (Wycliffe), Tim and Tricia Barrow (SIM), Lucy Haslam (UFM), Carrie McFarlane (Mission India), Francis and Diane Dognon (France), Hyndman's Trustees (our Patron) and Tearfund. We also made one-off donations to Night Shelter (Medway), Just One at Priestfield with J John (Kent) and the 'Let Loose' Concert (Gillingham).

We are grateful for the Support of Tim and Tricia Barrow as members of MLTG, with their many years first hand mission experience in the field.

It is good to receive news updates from those we support and these are published on our website. Please continue to pray for our Mission Partners and if you would like to join MLTG, please speak to either of us or Tim and Tricia.

Small Groups

Pauline writes: "The home group leaders met for breakfast in November where I took on the baton as small group coordinator. Please do come and talk to me if you would like to be part of a small group or start a new one! At the start of 2018 there will be a small group review, led by Amanda, to find out what we want from our small groups and what their future could look like".

Winter Night Shelter

Starting as a brand-new initiative in 2016, the Medway Winter Night Shelter is run by volunteers from across the churches, each playing roles in a variety of different capacities, with the aim to support the homeless and needy of Medway throughout the cold months of winter.

Joyce writes: "This is the first time I've volunteered locally at the MWNS. Considering I'm a local person I'm amazed and delighted at

the amount of Churches there are in Medway. I get the opportunity during quiet time, before "lights out", to read an array of literature and have met two lovely female Christian volunteers.

I can't explain the immense joy at seeing a full shelter on a really cold night, or indeed any night. Also, any donations of warm clothing I take in are gratefully received".

The guests have ranged from being new to street-homelessness to long-term on the streets. Most of the EU guests have not continued returning to the shelter and instead, have returned to street homelessness making use of the Emergency refuge when it's open.

Referrals have been sent in equal numbers through Caring Hands and Medway Council. Registration has been opened every day for at least an hour each day.

Medway Council visited each Thursday, Pathways have been in, the Stride Clinic has visited on three occasions and several guests have had their feet seen to and ill-fitting shoes replaced. A hairdresser has been on call and hair has been plaited; laundry is done on a rota basis - guests do appreciate the nice smelling duvets and pillows.

The transport has gone relatively well given the technological difficulties and all help is much appreciated. Fantastic meals have been served - always 2 courses, with a veggie option, and a good supply of tea, coffee and cold drinks. The Homeless Church service went well, and a dedicated group of pray-ers hold the shelter before God each week. Funds are coming in well, as are items for the shelter. All donations appreciated.

Youth, Children and Families Ministries

Children:

Crèche (up to 3 years old, meeting on a Sunday morning)

The area at the back of church has continued to be used for crèche throughout the year on Sundays when SOS Club is running. Crèche is for children, under 3 years old and their parents/carers, providing a small, protected area where parents/carers can keep an eye on the service at the same time as their children play with the toys provided.



The numbers vary each week but there are a few regulars who seem to feel at home in the small area provided. Thank you again to

those who have helped to keep the crèche area relatively clear and clean ready for Sunday mornings. We would appreciate your continued vigilance in ensuring that anything accessible (toys, resources, furniture) in this area is suitable for under 3's. The reason we ask for under 3's and their parents/carers only is because sometimes we get quite busy and, as the area is small, we need to make sure it is safe and not overwhelming for our youngest members.

Thank you for your understanding in recognising and valuing the youngest members of the church family. Please pray for these children and their parents/carers that they will experience God's love through the services.

Thank you to Natasha McCready who faithfully continues on the crèche rota and to Alastair and Lucy Williams for their support – their twins have now moved on to SOS, so they are stepping down from the rota. We are grateful to Katie Blewett who has recently joined the crèche team.

St. Mark's Pre-School (for 2 to 4-year olds, Monday to Friday during term-time)



Throughout the first half of 2017 the Pre-School ran with uncertainty over its future. Threat from changes in hours available for children (30 hours), tight finances/budgeting restraints and Committee resignations all added to concerns over the Pre-school continuing.

Fortunately, having managed to find replacements to the retiring Committee members, this gave the Pre-School a platform, in September, to continue the Pre-School practice and look to manage the issues that remained outstanding. New to the Pre-School Committee is Lance Hanning - Chair, Alastair Williams – Finance, Suzie Humphries – Secretary, Shane Cordle – general member and Assistant Chair. New to the Practice Staff was Andrea Benford, who replaced Andrea Cross as Healthy Eating Co-ordinator.

Whilst the uncertainty and issues were still live, the Pre-School continued its great work and high quality of learning experience for the children, and on the visit of Ofsted, gained the mark of "Good" from the inspectors.

From January 8th 2018, the Pre-School will operate two full days a week as a trial, with the view to monitor the extended Pre-Schools hours to 30 hours for 3-year olds (note: currently the trial is proving successful).

The Pre-School is no longer supported by the Local Authority funded Early Years Team (support from Local Agencies disbanded from December); instead a new independent agency has formed to which funding has been allocated by the PCC to join this new practise.

Julie and her team run the Pre-School with the intention that it should be a fun place to be, with an emphasis on learning by playing and doing.

Numbers of children attending have been steady and it has been pleasing to see the take up for the extra sessions on a Monday & Tuesday.

Planned for the future is a "Summer Pre-School" event embracing the "Feed the 5000" challenge, with personal invites to Pre-School Mums & Dads, Carers, their children and the Pre-School staff.

SOS Club (for 3-11 year olds, meeting on a Sunday morning)



SOS Club continues to be run by a volunteer team of leaders and helpers. During 2017, we met most Sunday mornings on the Old Vicarage site from 10.20am-11.40am to learn more about Jesus and how to grow in faith whilst playing, making, creating, reading the Bible, singing, praying and sometimes eating! The first Sunday of each month was All-Age worship in Church and each Fifth Sunday an All-Age friendly baptism service where we joined with the rest of our St Mark's family. As reported in previous years, numbers have continued to fluctuate week by week but, averaged out to 20 plus each Sunday.

During the first quarter of the year, we finished off the Christian Foundations course that was started in September 2016, using material from Urban Saints (Energize), looking at the Bible, Church, the Trinity and Worship. St Mary's Island

St. Mary's Island Church (SMIC)

The Electoral Roll for 2017 was 64 (also 64 for 2016). There were 11 infant baptisms and one Thanksgiving. The average Sunday attendance was 43 adults (43 in 2016) and 19 children (17 in 2016).



Outreach

- During 2017 the Church changed its Mission Statement to: *'Creating spaces for our community to encounter Jesus'*. This decision was made after meetings by a newly formed Mission Action Team (MAT) and also a Marketing and Communication Team (MARCOM). These teams meet to plan, review and recommend actions to the DCC or to receive a brief from the DCC. It was felt communication paramount if we are to deliver the new mission statement.
- Within the community a core of people help with the Island Youth Club, three people help with the joint churches venture of Night Shelter (at St Barnabas) and teams help lead a service at Charing House three times a year.
- There have been two carol singing events outdoors –outside The Ship and Trades (supported by the Salvation Army) and the Community Centre.
- The Dragon Boat Races had a good team from SMI – who reached the semi-final and gave a very creditable performance.
- A new venture together with St Mark's has been the introduction of a service at the King George V pub in Brompton.
- Messy Church continues to attract families, several of whom see Messy Church as their worship time.
- Our involvement with the school is via helping/leading Revolution and King's Squad aided by The Family Trust. John Bloor, Carolyn and Saju all lead worship at the school on a weekly basis.
- Three people now link with Lower Stoke Primary School and have helped with two R.E. days – for Easter and Christmas. This is ably led by Wendy Drobka.
- The Ladies group maintains a varied programme and attracts non-church visitors as well as some of our church regulars.
- The Welcome packs and leaflets have been re-designed and have been delivered to the new sector behind the school as well as the church having an updated leaflet to hand out to new comers as a welcome.
- A very successful venture with positive feedback this year was the painting of 275 stones with a representation of Jesus as a

swaddled baby. These were distributed around the island for three weeks in December for families to find and take home.

- Café style services continue on the 4th Sunday of the month.
- More people have been DBS checked and people are in post as Safeguarder - Elgar Curling (until 22.1.18 when Sandi James will take over), Verifier and Appointer (Jonica Thomas) and Safeguarding for the Elderly and Vulnerable (Janet Adkin).

St. Mary's Island C of E (Aided) Primary School (SMIS)

Church services at St Mary's Island are held in St Mary's Island School Hall. Each week a dedicated team of people set up the hall ready for worship.
